

Engaging in conversations with the community is crucial for assessing their needs, building trust, fostering collaboration, and ensuring informed and inclusive decision-making. This list is not exhaustive but serves as a guide to consider how your charter will work with the community.

- 1. What educational needs or gaps exist in our community that a new charter school could address?
- 2. How can the charter school align its mission and values with those of the community?
- 3. What specific programs or curricula would be most beneficial for our students and community?
- 4. How can the charter school incorporate community culture and history into its educational model?
- 5. What partnerships with local organizations, businesses, and institutions can the charter school establish to enhance educational opportunities?
- 6. What are the key concerns or reservations that community members have about a new charter school, and how can these be addressed?
- 7. What communication strategies will be most effective in keeping the community informed and engaged with the charter school's progress?
- 8. How can the charter school collaborate with existing schools and educational institutions in the area?
- 9. What strategies can be used to ensure the charter school is accessible to all students, including those with special needs or from disadvantaged backgrounds?
- 10. What community events or forums can be organized to discuss the charter school and gather input from residents?
